# VIJANDE

**With the purpose of showing and accentuating the work of the art dealer Fernando Vijande (Barcelona, 1930 – Madrid, 1986), the Fundació Suñol presents a group exhibition with work by numerous artists who exhibited under his guidance during the time he was director of Galería Vandrés and Galería Fernando Vijande, in Madrid. The goal is to explore his artistic sensibility, which many have defined as eclectic and intelligent, and attain a better understanding of his artistic vision during that crucial period.**

Fernando Vijande began his career in the world of art in 1971, in partnership with Gloria Kirby, with the opening of Galería Vandrés. After a decade of intense activity, that period ended when he opened Galería Fernando Vijande, in 1981. It was active until 1987, giving us a fifteen-year period where Vijande was working as an art dealer. Time and history have shown that Fernando Vijande's contribution was vitally important to the Spanish artistic ecosystem in the period spanning the democratic transition. After more than thirty years since his death in 1987, we have enough distance from which to properly assess the importance of Fernando Vijande's task amidst the new panorama, then emerging amidst high expectations.

The seventies were a time of rupture and agitation in Spain, both socially and politically. In the cultural sphere, desire for change was also seen on a mass scale, with contributions from various fields which unequivocally strove for a break with the past and a commitment to transformation. In this regard, Galería Vandrés and Galería Fernando Vijande were leading settings for contemporary art as it sought to contribute to the process of democratizing and modernizing the Spanish state, in consonance with the international context most relevant to it.

Given the many exhibitions Vijande organized and the lengthy list of artists he worked with, the Fundació Suñol and its curatorial team has chosen to focus on the work of those who did individual shows in either of the galleries, following a chronological order starting with the first exhibition done with Fernando Vijande. This exhibition also draws from a selection of current work from some of the participating artists, by way of reflecting the professional path taken by those who began their careers thanks to the dealer's support. At the same time, with the idea of further complementing this proposal, a catalogue will be published including documentation of Fernando

Vijande's career, as well as texts by María Escribano, Fernando Huici and Margit Rowell. Also featured is a list of exhibitions that took place during the almost sixteen years the two spaces were open, thus reflecting the dealer's scope of activity.


The organization of this exhibition at the Fundació Suñol responds to the binding friendship between Josep Suñol and Fernando Vijande, enabling us to define the show as a double homage: on the one hand, their personal relationship; on the other, the professional legacy of Fernando Vijande. During the years Vijande was director of the two galleries, Josep Suñol's collection of contemporary art already featured important work, although the exemplary relationship between the collector and the dealer, their personal and artistic complicity and the constant interchange of ideas between them meant for a fruitful period of collaboration, directly impacting the creative milieu of the time.

If we establish that contemporary artists during that period distinguished their work with a specific aesthetic and (it could not be otherwise) ethic, it might be equally appropriate to perform a similar analysis when it comes to the mass media, writers, intellectuals, musicians and other groups in society that contributed to the creative optimism of the time. For this reason, and alongside the artwork itself, this exhibition features a set of documents, catalogues, press reports, photographs and other material, in their majority contributed by individuals with connections to the activity of the galleries.


